
CELEBRATE URBAN BIRDS

The bird count and artistic bird house building event was held on a beautiful sunny day in Ward 8 in Oxon Run Park. The Friends of Oxon Run Park also partnered with LYL 365. Two representatives from the LYL worked with the children on building bird houses that they were able to paint and ake home.

After they built the bird houses we looked for birds in the Mother's Peace Garden and the James E. Bunn Amphitheater. Their findings are attached. There were many birds flying around the majestic trees. We also partnered with the DC Department of Transportation's Urban Forestry Administration as part of the festivities



LESSONS LEARNED

Part of the day was designed to have the children learn about the trees the birds were perched in as well. It was a very full day that lasted 4 1/2 hours. The beauty of the event was the children's excitement to find a bird, count it and try to figure out what kind of bird it was. Overall it was a wonderful education experience for the youth. We plan on implementing the 2nd phase before April 2022.

The pictures reflect how engaged the children were during this exercise. We are grateful to the "Celebrate Urban Birds" folks for providing the funds to help us organize something this special for our children who are often in traumatized communities riddled with crime and violence. This was a bit of a healing experience for them as well. They felt safe in the park and freely ran around to participate in this effort to celebrate birds.

We are looking forward to doing this again to ensure that our youth are connected to their environment by paying attention to what they see and hear. The most striking thing we learned is that they didn't realize that there were so many different birds in the park.
